Wrong!

Government may modify the contract

Why?

Reflect changes in

- Requirements/scope
- Duration
- Terms
- Clauses





Types of Contract Modifications

BILATERAL (BOTH PARTIES AGREE AND SIGN)

- Make negotiated equitable adjustments resulting from the issuance of a change order
- Definitize letter contracts
- Reflect other agreements of the parties modifying the terms of the contract

UNILATERAL (GOVERNMENT DIRECTS AND ONLY GOVERNMENT SIGNS)

- Make administrative changes
- Issue change orders
- Make changes authorized by clauses other than a changes clause
- Issue termination notices



Bilateral or Unilateral?

Standard Form (SF) 30 – Amendment of Solicitation/Modification of Contract

What Box in Block 13 is checked?

- Unilateral Change Orders Block 13A
- Bilateral Modifications Changes Clause Block 13C
- Other Unilateral Modifications exercise option Block 13D

Has the Contracting Officer already signed in Block 16B?

- Yes Probably Unilateral
- No Probably Bilateral

EXAMPLE -FAR 22.19 Establishing a Minimum Wage for Contractors – E.O. 13658

Federal Acquisition Circular 2005-79 From the December 15, 2014, Federal Register



- (1) Contracting Officers shall include the clause in bilateral modifications extending the contract when such modifications are individually or cumulatively longer than six months.
- (2) In accordance with FAR 1.108(d)(3), contracting officers are strongly encouraged to include the clause in existing indefinite-delivery indefinite-quantity contracts, if the remaining ordering period extends at least six months and the amount of remaining work or number of orders expected is substantial.



Considerations

- What is the impact to the contract?
- What is the overall cost?
- Will it take more time to complete the contract?
- Will other contracts also be impacted?
- Can you reduce the cost by spreading over other contracts?
- Is the FAR changing or an agency supplement?
- What is the best business decision to make?



Modification Impacts Contract Cost

Determine and document actual changes in cost

- If Fixed Price contract and contract amount increases request compensation/equitable adjustment
- If Fixed Price contract and contract amount decreases profit increases – or offer Government discounted price
- If Cost Type contract contract amount may increase or decrease based upon the actual costs

Results in a Bilateral Modification





Takeaways

- Review every request for contract modification do not just sign and send back to the Government.
- Contractor should perform work described in modification. If contractor does not agree to the modification, notify the Government in writing as soon as possible.
- Government issuing a unilateral modification instead of a bilateral modification. Follow up in writing with the impact of the modification to the contract and be ready to negotiate.
- Government requests a unilateral modification be signed.
 Contractor is not required to sign a unilateral modification.
